This has been a busy semester for our students and staff! In addition to the normal academic commitments and extra-curricular opportunities, our school community has been very involved in our Beamsville community. Early in September, Charlize Breukelman (Grade 11) joined Sam Oosterhoff (Niagara-Glanbrook M.P.P) in a walk throughout Beamsville for the Lincoln 150 Celebration. Charlize and Mr. Oosterhoff completed their walk at the steps of Beamsville District Secondary School (BDSS) where the Lincoln community

gathered to listen to speeches and a rousing rendition of “O Canada”. All the local schools were represented, but our Great Lakes Chorus by far outnumbered all other representatives. Our students sang with pride and represented many nations who have made Canada their home. On the same day, several of our students also got into costume—and character—as Town of Lincoln citizens from 150 years ago!

One week later, our students, and staff representatives, Beth (Junkin) Whitehead ('84) and

Rachael King ('08), served as helpers in the annual Food Drive in support of Community Care of West Niagara. Students helped local fire fighters and the Lions club to collect, sort, pack and load food from all over Lincoln. Consistently the feedback from Community Care has been that our students are diligent and cheerful workers and that they serve willingly. For many of our students this was the first time to take part in a food drive; for others this event has become an annual tradition. We are blessed to have opportunity to serve in the Town of Lincoln!

Although our campus has only a few staff present in the summer, we are blessed and grateful to be able to partner with local community initiatives that can take advantage of this quiet space when students are not here. In August 2017, more than 100 youth aged 6-12 participated in the first Lions Club sponsored Lincoln Soap Box Derby. The committee for the event was in need of a long paved surface that had a slight slope, and Bailey Drive (the main entrance to the campus) did the trick! Just one day

after our new light standards were erected, hundreds of spectators came to watch local young people race their soap box cars. With plenty of protection for drivers around posts and light standards, the soap box cars were released from the bed of a truck at the

top of our driveway and ended their journey at the bottom of our parking lot. A resounding success, the Derby is planned to be an annual event. For every opportunity God gives us to connect with and serve our local community we are grateful.

Gospel 101 *and Chapel*

For several years we have offered an “Introduction to Christianity and the Bible” class for those international students who come to us without having a Christian background. Four years ago, we revised this offering to stretch across an entire semester, be more engaging, and be more accessible. The students are heavily encouraged to respond in the form

enthusiastic about asking questions. With that said, there are always challenges. The language barrier can make it difficult to communicate ideas. The dedicated ESL program helps a lot with language as the year progresses, and Friendspeak, a program offered by the Tintern Church of Christ, teaches English Language Learners English by reading the Bible. Taken together, understanding of language and the Bible are simultaneously improved.

Cultural differences can be challenging as well. One way we’ve worked through cultural differences is by finding historical connections that exist between Christianity and the cultures from which the students come. For example, for the past two years Looney Mo (‘16), a former student, has come back to guest-teach one class on righteousness, highlighting that the ancient Chinese symbol for righteousness is actually a “Lamb” over “Me.”

The greatest challenge, however, is in the hearts of our students. We cannot solve this with programs or classes, but only with prayer and love. We ask you to continue to pray for our students, that the hardest of hearts will be softened, and that all of them will come to know God and His love for them. We will continue

to love, encourage, and teach, but it is God and God alone who can save these students and transform their lives for His glory. Thank you for your support and the ability to reach the nations.

Chapel 2017-18

There have been a few new additions to our Chapel program this year, including at least one that harkens back to a previous practice that has not been used in some years.

First, we have re-introduced old school sword drills, which has encouraged students to not only bring their Bibles to Chapel, but to open those Bibles and read them collectively. We are encouraged that the students are reading the Word more often during Chapel and actively referencing passages in their Chapel Notebooks, which is a second addition/practice implemented this year. This increase in application and participation has been a welcome shift, one for which we’ve been praying for some time.

A third addition is our mysterious brick wall that was constructed earlier in the year. Slowly, over the course of the semester, bricks have been removed, teaching critical and foundational things about God and the Bible. A picture sits behind the bricks, being revealed one brick at a time. The final brick will be removed at Easter, and no one has been told what the big reveal will be. The hint is that it ties into 2 Corinthians 3:16-18, but that’s all I can say. You’ll have to read the next edition of the Laker Connection to find out!

The WAVES (Women's Association for Vital Educational Support) has grown exponentially since the 1950's when we first started. Though we have grown, the vision for the WAVES has not changed. Our goal is to serve God through fundraising for Great Lakes through many different venues. The funds the WAVES have raised have gone towards student scholarships, teachers' bonuses, capital projects, dorm funds, new tables/chairs, new lighting along the driveway, bus repairs, and computer software and upgrades—and this is just in the last few years! We believe in the school and its mission, and our efforts have resulted in over a one million dollars being raised for the school over the years.

May 2017 at the Annual General Meeting, I became the new WAVES president. Two of my children, Mackenzie ('15) and Dylan ('17) have already graduated from Great Lakes, and Logan is currently enrolled in Grade 9. We have supported and believed in the vision of the school, knowing it to be a supportive place for our family as a whole.

Over the years, the WAVES have prepared thousands of pies, squares, cakes, meat pies, pastries, and a hundred other things for meals and desserts. We have catered for large and small wedding receptions,

anniversaries, church luncheons, birthdays and special holidays. Besides all the cooking and baking we do, we quilt, knit, crochet, sell spring bulbs, participate in mall sales, preserve jams and jellies, sell maple syrup, and have put on hundreds of garage sales. We help run the Mom to Mom sales,

appreciated! Each of our helpers has made a difference and the WAVES are able to make a difference at GL.

Our goal in 2017-18 is to raise \$30,000 for the school, and we know that it is ambitious. It is only through the helping hands of not only our members, but everyone else who lends their time and hands to our cause that we believe we can succeed.

Great Lakes is **Going Digital!**

You might think I'm a little crazy when I say going digital. I mean we already have a computer lab, Smartboards in classrooms, top notch projectors, and sound equipment; how much more 'digital' can we get? Well, we are happy to announce that we are moving in the direction of 1:1 devices for our school. Sounds exciting, right? Of course, that's only if you know what 1:1 is.

The idea is all students and staff have their own personal digital device that goes with them everywhere they need for the school year. Students will be able to use cutting edge technology to do their everyday learning, teachers will be encouraged and equipped to be innovative in their lessons and assessments, and all of us will have the opportunity to become responsible digital citizens in a rapidly growing digital world.

The road to 1:1 has taken a group of teachers, administrators, IT specialists, and board members to several different schools that have already adopted this type of environment. There have been countless meetings to talk about how we can best serve our school with the adaptation of these devices, and this will change our school environment. Physically, this means students will never have to move to another over-booked space to do much of their work; moreover, it will allow us to turn our computer lab into additional classroom space. Technologically, this change has us incorporating an online Great Lakes environment to allow instant collaboration, teaching, and learning opportunities.

Changes have already started to take place. Faculty are already testing the devices we will be

using and they are participating in ongoing Professional Development sessions to learn how to best teach and serve our students with these devices. We have been making changes to our wireless environment, exploring options like Google for Education and Microsoft Office 365, and sharing online discoveries that can improve the in-class learning environment.

In September 2018 we will roll out devices for students, and have our new online environment launched for the start of the 2018-2019 school year. It is an exciting time for our community and for our students. Our hope and prayer is that this initiative is yet another opportunity for us to seek, serve, and become like Christ. Indeed, as we learn to become digital citizens, we may do so with a Kingdom citizen mindset.

Great Lakes Christian Preschool Grows into its third decade of service!

This year has brought both joy and new challenges to the preschool and to the families we serve. Our program has grown, allowing us to open up new opportunities for our kids even though there were some very large changes that had to be made. It has been an exciting adventure and I'm grateful to those who have supported us.

When I started seven years ago, we were serving twenty-seven families. This number has grown to fifty! We would love to keep growing, but we have capped the enrolment due to space, resources, and manpower. The growth has been a tremendous blessing and we have loved giving back to our community. After twenty years of dedicated service we find we are able to do very little advertising, relying entirely on our website and word of mouth, and the result is that our program has filled and we are still receiving inquiries.

We have grown the most in

two ways this past year. In January 2017, Corrie Rose started a program called Kindermusik. We were very excited to introduce music into our program and had not been able to afford the experience until last year. It was so well received that we decided to implement Kindermusik again into

growth is our ability to support the development of special needs children and particularly those children who may be on the autism spectrum. We have more access to specialists, agencies, and resources that enable us to do more for our students than ever before.

We must emphasize our thankfulness to God for all He has done to build our reputation as people who love, care and genuinely serve in the community.
